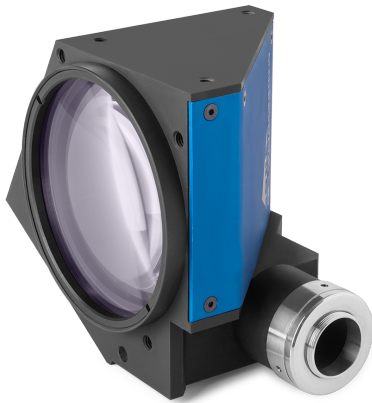

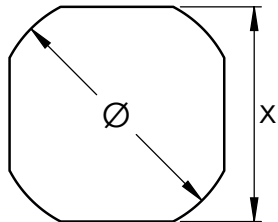

IMAGE SHAPE DIMENSION



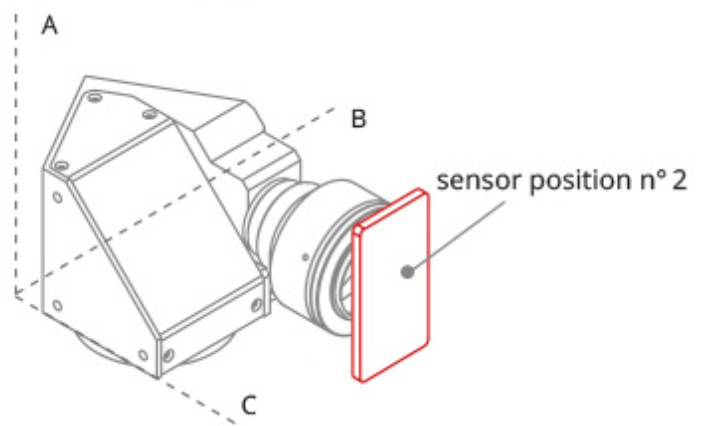
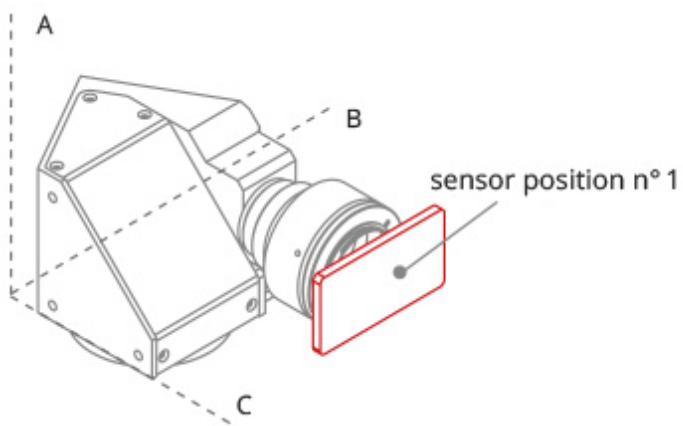

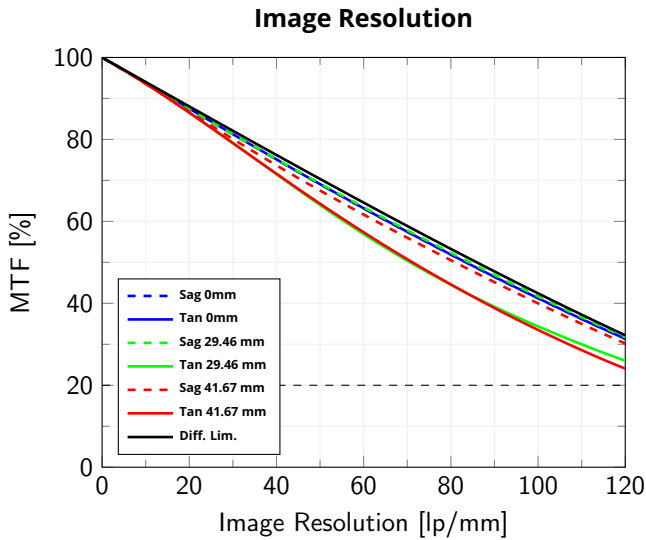

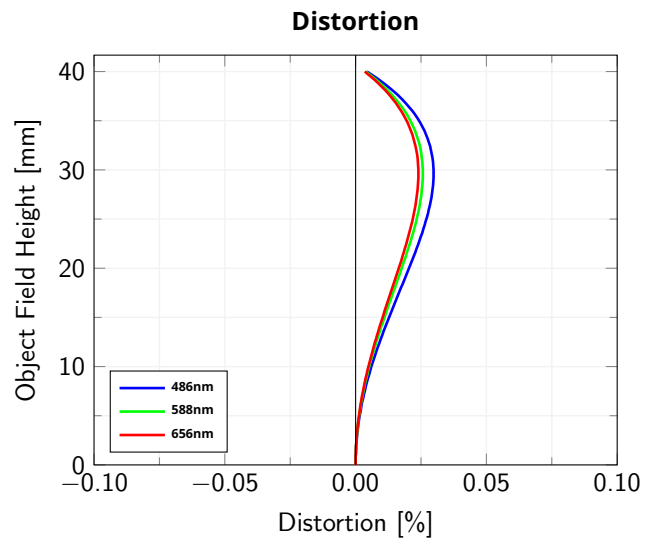

TC CORE LENS DIMENSION (A, B, C) AND CORRECT SENSOR POSITION

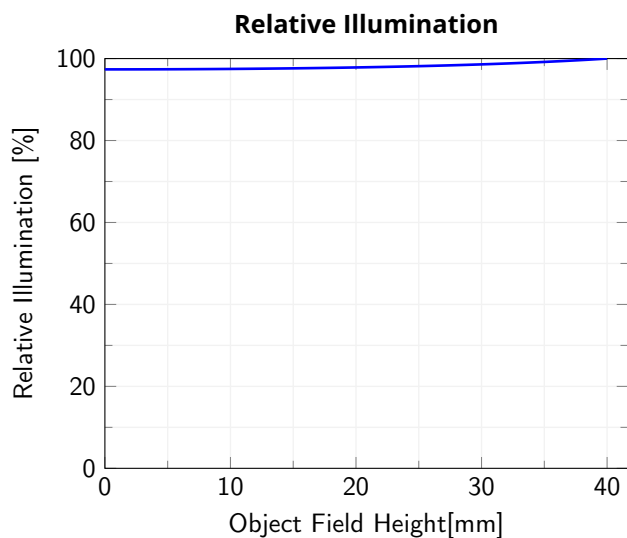




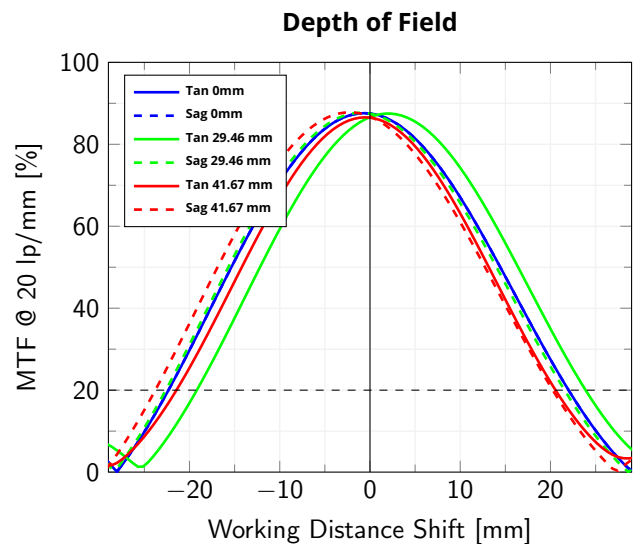
Modulation Transfer Function (MTF) vs. Image Resolution, wavelength range 486 nm - 656 nm
